Preparation is the key to your career success! This section provides you with guidelines for career planning, as well as tips for how to prepare for the job interview process.

Career Planning

There are aspects of planning for our careers that we all have difficulty with. The following section includes some tips for your career planning given the general tendencies of your Striving Style. By following these tips, you can help yourself to overcome some of your own resistance to the planning and preparation process, and address the areas that may be your natural blind spots. These tips can also help you to consider things you might typically overlook in your career planning if you are approaching it from your Predominant Style only.

For example if you tend to be an adaptable improviser like the Adventurer or Performer, you may tend to take work that presents itself to you rather than identifying what it is you actually want; if you are a Stabilizer, you will learn to seek information from trusted people in your life regarding their career experiences, to expand your resources beyond what you yourself have experience with. Follow the tips and the instructions provided to prepare a more complete picture of the career you would like to have, so you can then take action to achieve it. As an Adventurer, here are some strategies to follow when planning your career:

TAKE YOUR TIME

Adventurers tend to take the path of least resistance, which means you could end up investing time in something that is not right for you. Don't take the first thing that comes along, simply because it seems easy or because it's offered to you, or because someone you know "knows somebody".

DO WHAT YOU LIKE

Think about what activities you enjoy and see if there are careers that align with those activities. Identify what you like about each activity, and what you don't. Don't just look at what excites you; weigh the pros and cons.

WORK WITH OTHERS

Enlist the help of a trusted friend, counselor or family member to help you plan your career, as planning is not an activity you naturally gravitate towards. Remember also that just because someone makes a suggestion, doesn't mean it's right for you.


